

### **TYPES OF PROGRAMS**











#### University Degree Programs

- Bachelor degree
  - typically 4 years
  - within a faculty, will declare a major, possibly a minor
  - opportunity for dual degrees
  - admission based on averages ensure you are familiar with admission requirements
  - If you don't meet admission averages, some schools have university entrance options or general studies

#### College/Technical Diploma and Certificate Program

- Program lengths differ, usually up to two years
- Many of these programs are first apply first admit
- Ex. Bow Valley, some SAIT programs
- May sometimes have waitlists
- Apprenticeships will have both workplace and classroom components





#### **TYPES OF PROGRAMS**

#### Continuing Education

- Course lengths differ, typically no entrance requirements
- Not always for post-secondary credit but can be useful in building skills for future studies or employment
- --> Personal Fitness Trainer, Strategic Planning (MRU)
- --> Event Technician, Graphic Design Certificate of Achievement (SAIT)

#### • High School Upgrading

- --> Chinook Learning Services (In Person) or CBe-Learn (Online)
- --> Free until turn 20 years old as of September 1st
- --> Post-Secondary Institution Specific, not always transferable

## Calgary Post-Secondary Institutions

#### **Colleges**

Generally offer 2-year diploma programs and certificates

- <u>SAIT</u>
- Bow Valley College

#### **Public Universities**

Government subsidized tuition; more degree options; generally require a higher competitive average

- University of Calgary
- Mount Royal University
- Alberta University of the Arts

#### **Private Universities**

Higher tuition fees; smaller class sizes; fewer degree options; generally lower competitive average

- Ambrose University
- St. Mary's University

## **CHOOSING A PROGRAM**

#### This usually happens in one of 2 ways:

- A) A student has a particular career or occupation in mind and finds a program to help meet that goal
- B) A student knows the general area of study but may not be certain of career





#### **Before You Start**

The ApplyAlberta system will allow you to create a profile with your personal information and academic history. This information is filled in automatically on your application(s) to Alberta post-secondary institutions.

#### You will need the following:

- 1. A MyAlberta Digital ID. You will be prompted to create a MyAlberta Digital ID if you do not already have one.
- 2. Your Alberta Student Number (ASN). If you have applied to or attended a school or post-secondary institution in Alberta, you will already have an ASN. To find your ASN, you can use the ASN Lookup service. If you do not have an ASN, the ApplyAlberta system will assign one to you.
- 3. Names of all high schools and post-secondary institutions you have attended or are currently attending.
- 4. High school courses and marks (for currently enrolled Canadian students only).
- 5. A credit card or other accepted method of payment will be necessary to pay any application fees charged by the institution(s).




















## Applying

- Applications generally open the beginning of October.
- Some have firm deadlines (March 1st for University of Calgary; January 15th for the University of British Columbia).
- Apply early (ex. Rolling admission policy)
- Most post-secondary institutions allow students to select 2 program choices.

## After Applying

- Check your email to ensure that receipt of application is received
- Ensure you read the email verification closely and confirm next steps
- Apply for entrance awards and scholarships
- Apply for residence, if applicable
- Mid-February- send an interim transcript (outside of Alberta)
- If offered conditional acceptance: accept offer, pay tuition deposit, and register for classes
- If attending university outside of Alberta, order final transcript to be sent via MyPass

## Transcripts

- Pay close attention to what the institution is asking regarding transcripts and course grade submissions as the process is not standardized.
- U of C will require course grade submission from Apply Alberta. U of A requires course grades are inputted into their Launch Pad Portal. MRU requires students to complete a self-reported grade form and predict the final grades they will receive in grade 12.
- University of Calgary and other Alberta-based institutions will automatically request transcripts for students who have attended high school in Alberta.
- Students who have applied to a post-secondary school outside of Alberta are required to have a MyPass account initiated to request final transcripts to be sent in July. The process for uploading an initial and interim transcript will vary by institution.

## Applying Outside of Alberta

- Ensure you meet academic requirements in grade 11 year. Many universities have different requirements:
- UBC- Many programs require Physics 20 as an application requirement;
   recommended to apply with 6- 30 level courses
- University of Victoria- Apply with 4-30 level approved courses
- Familiarize yourself with approved options; out of province post-secondary schools may not recognize CTS courses but will fine arts and languages.



## Why are Scholarships Important?


- **Tuition**: \$6000-\$11 000
- Books and supplies: \$1,307 to \$1,717
- **Mandatory fees:** \$611 to \$1,275
- Living expenses (living with parents): \$2,000 to \$4,000
- Living expenses (living independently for 8 months): \$9,000 to \$11,200

# What Is A Scholarship?

- A <u>scholarship</u> is a monetary award which is often based on a variety of criteria:
  - Academics
  - Volunteer work/Leadership
  - Extracurricular activities
  - Sports





## What Is A Bursary?

- A **bursary** is a monetary grant that is usually based on financial need.
- The student is in need of financial assistance in order to continue their education

### Student Government Loans

- Both the Federal and Provincial governments provide student loans for postsecondary study. Students must be Canadian citizens or permanent residents and need to apply through the province that considers them a resident. Government student loans are intended to be supplemental to student and family resources and are awarded based on financial need.
- Apply through <u>Student Aid Alberta</u>

## Types of Scholarships

#### 1) Institution-Based Scholarships

Every post-secondary institution will offer first year scholarships for first year students.

Check the institution's web page for a list of these scholarships.

















## Institutions Based *Entrance* Scholarships

- Open to students *admitted* to the postsecondary institute directly from high school.
- Students MUST apply to the institute in order to be considered.
- Students are considered based on their grade point average from high school. Often they are automatic/no separate application. \*Check institution websites!





### 2. Membership Scholarships

- Many organizations have scholarships available to members and their families.
  - Example A.T.A. (AB Teachers Association)
  - Could include employers, clubs, cultural organizations, religious institutions, or teams.





## 3. CBE/Local Based Scholarships

- Managed by the Calgary Board of Education.
- Selected at school or city level.
- The typical application time for these is in the spring of the students Grade 12 year.
   There are a few available for grade 10 and 11 students
- --> Education Matters

## 4. Corporate Scholarships

- Nationally or provincially selected
  - E.g. Toyota,
     T.D. Bank,
     Scotia Bank









### 5. Government Scholarships

- Alberta: Alexander Rutherford Scholarship
  - 75% 80% and higher average in 5 subjects in grade 10, 11, and 12.
  - Different monetary amounts awarded depending on average.
  - Value varies from \$300 to \$2500
  - Apply in Gr 12 after being accepted
