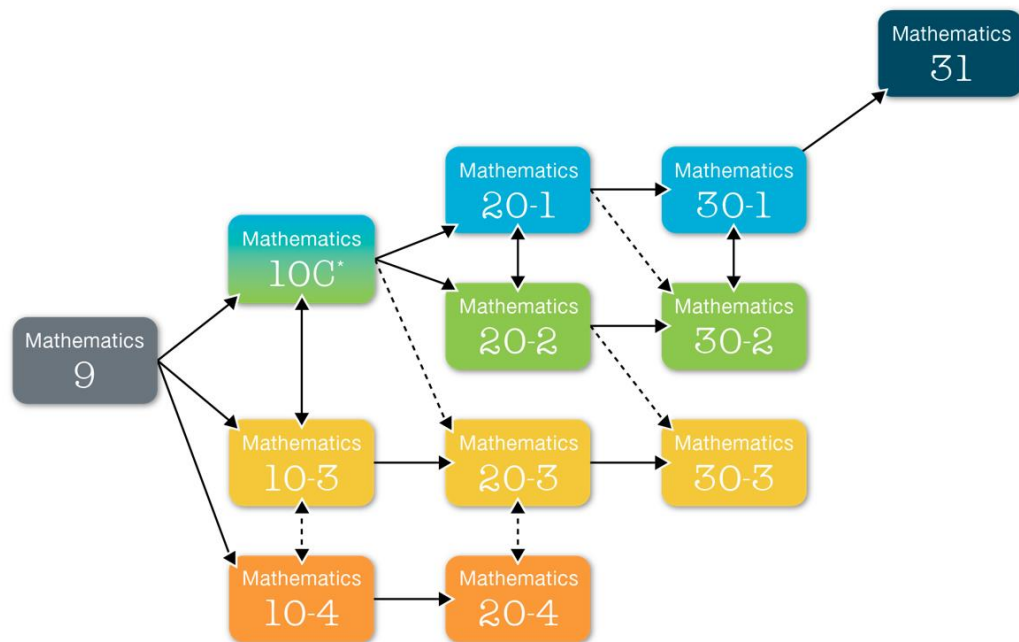

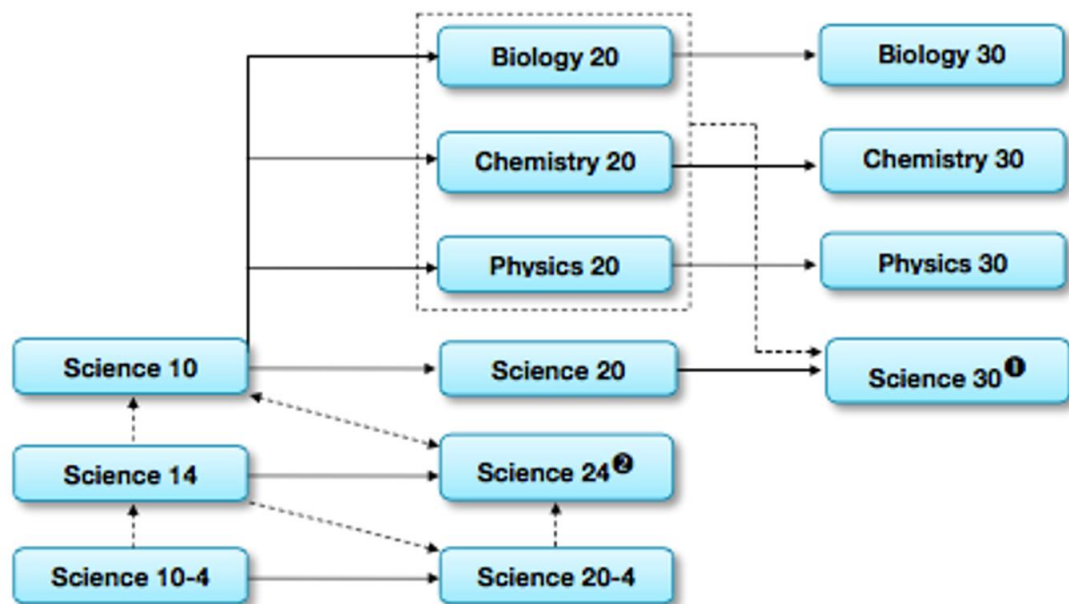

Universities typically look for five 30 level academic courses or admission, **including ELA 30-1**

You must research the admission requirements for the institution you are applying to, as they are not standardized. For example, UBC requires 6 academic courses. Some Universities will accept CTS classes as an approved course and some will not.



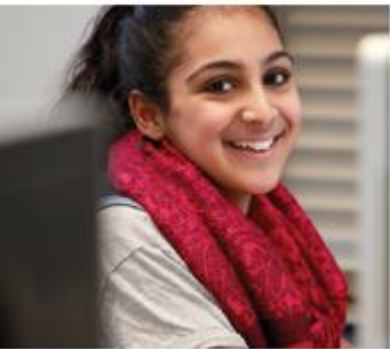

Why AP?

AP forms a strong foundation for students moving into post-secondary

Many post-secondary institutions offer credit for AP courses taken in high school

this is done after an evaluation by the university registrar's office

Scores of 4 or 5 will earn the credit

RTHS alumni report that AP was instrumental in their success at university

They felt exceptionally prepared for the requirements of higher education

Specifically, AP provided them with a significant background in research, which allowed them to flourish in the independent inquiry projects required in higher level Engineering, Science, Mathematics and Computer Science programs

Grade 11: The registration portal will be open March 7th-March 14th. You will not be able to independently register for courses after **March 14th**. Course Registration sheets due to **Period 2 teacher** by **March 14th**.

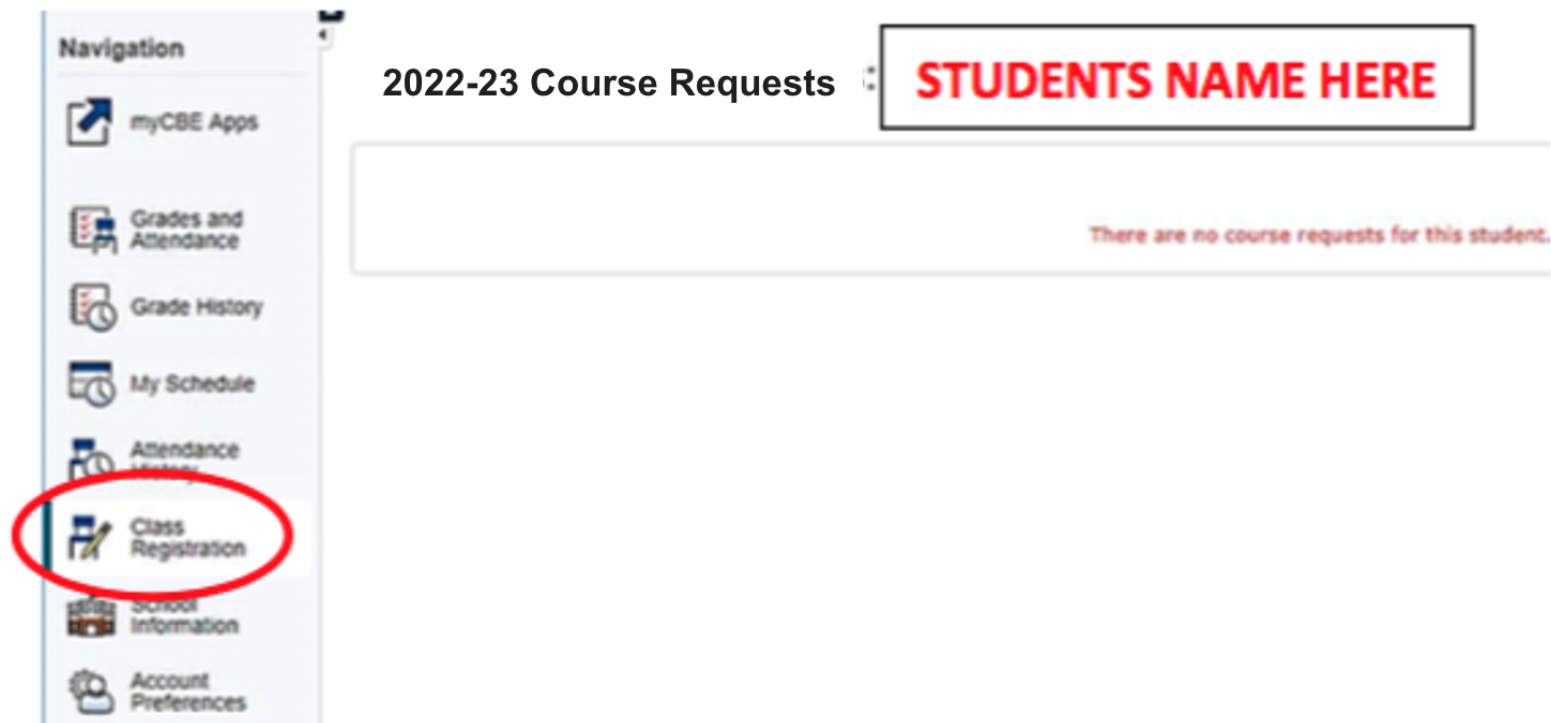
